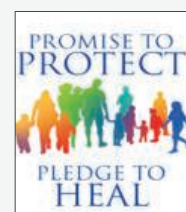

Pentecost

Pentecost marks the occasion of God sending the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' disciples after his Resurrection. The book of Acts describes how the disciples were gathered together in one place on the day of Pentecost. The Jewish feast of Pentecost (Shavuot or the Feast of Weeks) was a day that commemorated the giving of the law to Moses, a day soon to be marked as well by the giving of the Holy Spirit.

On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit gave the disciples the strength to fulfill their commission to spread the Good News of Jesus. The Solemnity of Pentecost, which crowns and fulfills the Easter season, is a good time to pray for a deeper indwelling of the Holy Spirit.

Prayer to the Holy Spirit

The following prayer was recited by Pope Benedict XVI in a homily on November 7, 2006. This is a prayer to the Holy Spirit.

Let us invoke him
so that he will irrigate, warm and straighten,
so that he will pervade us
with the power of his sacred flame
and renew the earth.
Let us pray for his with all our hearts
at this time, in these days.
Amen.

JUNE 8, 2025 – PENTECOST

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

We lovers of classical symphonies are used to long pieces of music ending with a loud crescendo of timpani, or kettle drums. These drums are often seen at the back of the orchestra and called upon by composers to deliver thunderous percussion impact of a kind no other instrument can. You could say the music "ends with a bang."

No doubt that upper room on Pentecost was filled with the sharp clap of thunder, with wind howling until the tongues of fire appeared over the heads of the frightened Apostles. But the "happening" was definitely the end of doubt and the fear that could come with it. All the noise preceded a calm resolution in their hearts to leave their self-imposed isolation and greet the crowd outside with some "Good News." Jesus is alive; He is God; and He has saved us from our sins!

Pentecost marks the end of the long Lent-Easter cycle in the Church year. Ash Wednesday often comes on a dreary day in mid to late February. Pentecost closes matters on a Sunday in May or early June with warm sunshine and flowers.

All these centuries later, we still celebrate these central events, up to and including this day. The day that our Church was "born." As the special day that the Holy Spirit came down, not crashing as much as landing on the heads of the first leaders of Christianity. The Spirit comes as Jesus had predicted.

What a thrill the recall of this event should be for us and for all who believe! For we acknowledge ourselves as the Church on earth! We are also members of the Mystical Body, with Christ Himself as our Head.

We can be so proud to realize that the Holy Spirit has never left the Church in all her mixed history of ups and downs. His guidance precludes any lapse of error in her official teachings as she marches through time. However, we must never forget that we are all redeemed sinners, made so by a loving God whose Son's ultimate sacrifice opened the doors of heaven.

Meanwhile, we still have many unanswered questions. Let's not forget that life here below is replete with riddles. One of them is illustrated by this story. Once upon a time, the beloved pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dallas, Texas was asked, "Will we know each other when we get to heaven?" His answer: "We won't really know each other until we get to heaven."

God love you and give you His Pentecost peace.

This Is Pope Leo XIV's Prayer Intention for the Month of June

He then recited an original prayer to the Sacred Heart of Jesus:

Lord, I come to your tender heart today,
to you who have words that set my heart ablaze,
to you who pour out compassion on the little ones and the poor, on those who suffer, and on all human miseries.

I desire to know you more, to contemplate you in the Gospel,
to be with you and learn from you
and from the charity with which you allowed yourself to be touched by all forms of poverty.

You showed us the Father's love by loving us without measure with your divine and human heart.

Grant all your children the grace of encountering you.

Change, shape, and transform our plans,
so that we seek only you in every circumstance:

in prayer, in work, in encounters, and in our daily routine.

From this encounter, send us out on mission,
a mission of compassion for the world

in which you are the source from which all consolation flows. Amen.



What Pentecost Means for the Christian Life

[The season of Pentecost](#) celebrates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and the [birth of the Church](#). But what does Pentecost mean for the Christian life? What does it mean for you and I personally?

We need to live Pentecost each and every day—not just right after Easter. Otherwise, the sacraments just become “checking the box”. We need to get “into the upper room”—that is, the room in which the Holy Spirit first descended upon Mary and the Apostles on Pentecost. We’re called to partake of the same holy fire in the Holy Spirit.

And then we have to get “out of the upper room”. To go forth and spread the Gospel in the world, just as the Apostles did. The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us that the sacraments aren’t “magic”. They depend on God’s grace first, and also our willing participation.

Peter was baptized, and yet he still denied Jesus three times. It wasn’t until the Holy Spirit came upon him at Pentecost that he had the courage to go out and proclaim the Good News. Saint Irenaeus explains this beautifully.

So how do we receive an outpouring of the Holy Spirit? Well, the Church invites us to receive this outpouring primarily through the sacrament of Confirmation. This sacrament isn’t “graduation from the Catholic faith”; on the contrary, it’s an invitation to be sent forth into the world to proclaim the Gospel in the Spirit. Confirmation activates our baptism. You can see this in action in the Acts of the Apostles.

The traditional Prayer of the Holy Spirit is a beautiful invocation that has its basis in the Psalms:

“When thou sendest forth thy Spirit, they are created, and thou renewest the face of the ground.” Psalm 104:30

This is what the Holy Spirit wants to do through us. To renew the face of the earth. To heal the body of Christ. When the Holy Spirit dwells within you, “you can’t help but take it out into the world.”

Reflection on the Readings for Pentecost - June 8, 2025

RIGHT RELATIONSHIPS

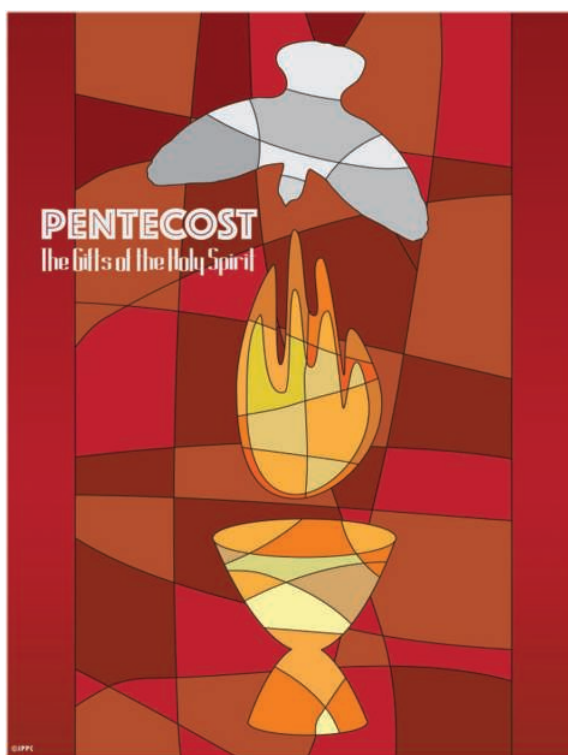
Fire. It's intense, beautiful, dangerous, overwhelming, warm, and all consuming. Fire can be used to warm us on a cold night, or as a way to gather friends on a summer evening. It can also yield immense destruction. Fire is powerful. This is the image that we hear about today as we learn more about the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles at Pentecost. At our Confirmation, we too receive the gift of the Spirit. But have our hearts been set ablaze like those of the Apostles? Do we radically and unabashedly share Christ with those around us, setting their hearts ablaze, too?

PRAYER

The disciples are paralyzed by fear. They have hidden themselves in a locked room, afraid that they will be put to death for being followers of Christ. Imagine them huddled around the room. What might they have been talking about? They were probably dejected and confused. Their teacher, the man they believed to be God, had been killed. And then Jesus surprises them. He immediately puts their hearts at ease as he says, "Peace be with you." He reveals his wounds and again offers them peace. Place yourself among the disciples in that locked room. What is it like when Jesus first appears? Are you more scared? Confused? What do his hands and feet look like? As he speaks words of peace, how does your heart change? Take some time to be part of this scene. When a phrase or moment strikes you, stop and pray with it.

Jesus breathes his Spirit upon the disciples and sends them out, giving them authority to teach and forgive in his name. You, too, have received the Spirit of Christ through Baptism and Confirmation. Do you shamelessly share Christ with others?

Have you heeded the Spirit or ignored his promptings? Commit this week to sharing Christ with someone you meet or already know.



RESOLUTION

Fruits of the Spirit. If we are living in the Spirit, there are certain fruits that will manifest in our lives. Jesus tells us that, "You will know them by their fruits ... every sound tree bears good fruit, but the bad tree bears evil fruit. A sound tree cannot bear evil fruit, nor can a bad tree bear good fruit" (Matthew 7:16–18). If you allow the Holy Spirit to work in your life, you will notice charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness, faithfulness, modesty, self-control, and chastity. Wow! What a plethora of good things! We all long for these in our lives. The key to unlocking them is by living in the Holy Spirit. Welcome him each morning, throughout the day, and in the evening to reign in your heart and guide your actions that day. As you grow closer to him, God will increasingly live through you, and you will notice these wonderful fruits in abundance in your life. [|formed.org](https://formed.org)

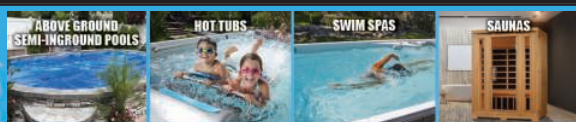

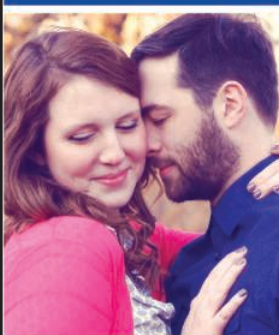
